## Barbara Krell October 11, 1943 - January 1, 2000

arbara Krell was my best friend. We met when our youngest children were in pre-school together and discovered a mutual interest in hiking and natural history. Hiking grew to include camping and backpacking as we expanded our horizons exploring the Pacific Northwest. We hiked many hundreds of miles, mostly in the Olympics, learning more and more about the geology and botany around us. It was a shared passion I've found in no other person. She was a part of my life for 23 years and we often joked about how we would still be hiking in the Olympics as little old ladies.

About 9 years ago cancer became a part of Barb's life. But, even as she struggled with it and its treatment she was determined to continue as many outdoor activities as she could. She asked her husband to mark the outline of her backpack straps on her chest so when the portacath for chemo infusion was implanted she could still wear her backpack. She amazed me and others how active she remained and her tenacity made it easy to be lulled into the false sense that maybe the cancer would just go away. Unfortunately, it was not to be and she lost her battle with breast cancer on January 1, 2000.

Barb enjoyed many great times with Peninsula Wilderness Club members—hiking, skiing and especially, the 3 trips to the Grand Canyon. I am grateful I was able to join her on a 4<sup>th</sup> trip last April to Havasu Canyon with her sons.

Barb was my best friend. I'll miss her deadly.

#### The Banff Mountain Film Festival

The argument could well be made that the center of the universe for Mountaineering is in Banff. This little resort town in the Canadian Rockies of Alberta meets all of the criteria that could be used for Yosemite, or those cute little towns in the European Alps, or maybe even Katmandu. In addition to the challenging moun-

tain routes close at hand and a history of courageous and innovative mountaineers, Banff also offers a lofty, energetic and intellectual center for the academic study of mountaineering in the present tense as well



as a serious collection and study of climbing history. The heart of this vital contemporary school of intellectual and physical energy is the Banff Centre. The roots of "The Centre" are in the Arts, the original name; The Banff Centre for the Arts was changed to emphasize the current four fundamental arms of emphasis: The Banff Centre for Management, The Banff Centre for Conferences and The Banff Centre for Mountain Culture.

With an emphasis on Arts and Mountaineering it is certainly unremarkable that the
Centre should sponsor the annual Mountaineering
Book and Film Festival. 1999 was the twentyfourth feting of this delightful early November
event and to those who have an interest in the

mountains, nature, ecological issues and muscle powered adventures this should be a "must-do" on the life list.

If one is serious about seeing the films, it is possible to sit in a campus theater for three days for several hours a day. (A very comfortable intimate campus theater none-the-less.) This very activity, or more accurately inactivity, is the antithesis of what mountaineer types do for pleasure. I would suggest at the onset that in order to enjoy this event one must not only enjoy mountaineering, or kayaking or hiking or the politics of environmental issues; one must also enjoy the intellectual aspect of these pursuits. This event is for those hobby-adventure types who, though never will have the skill, money, energy, time or opportunity to climb in the Himalayas, enjoy learning about the adventures of others vicariously.



This is a juried show and as such there is a selection process, and out of 175 films submitted for presentation only 30 were shown in the main three-day presentation. The attendee has a surfeit of good choices, but for *most* people the Eric Harvie Theater is where the action is. The

jury included two with local roots: Kitty Calhoun and Tom Hornbein. It is important to note that these are not all great films, certainly it could be said that they are at the very least good films, and maybe even great mountain films. The relative ease with which modern filmmaking techniques can be used on big walls as compared to high-risk adventure travel such as big mountains leaves a strong bias with filmmakers in favor of the former. It would be unnatural for attendees to this event to not call into question the selections of the jury. This reporter would fault the jury for too many big wall films, as well as placing too much emphasis on the subject matter and not enough on the overall quality of the film. The complaint is small however when compared to the overall grandeur, excitement, spectacle and simple fun of attending this event. The best films are truly spectacular.

The opening night guest speaker was Göran Kropp—the "crazy guy" mentioned in *Into Thin Air*— the man who bicycled to Mount Everest from his home in Sweden. It was truly a delightful presentation, one he was to repeat in Seattle a few days later. One of the joys of the Banff Festival is the approachability of the producers/authors/etc. Dan Austin, the producer and star of one of the films mailed us a video print of his film (*True Fans*) for \$10.00—and he paid the \$3.00 postage.

It hardly needs to be pointed out to the readers of the *Penwicle* what a joy Banff is to visit, and even though Banif is an easy long day drive from Kitsap County, this reporter would find it very difficult to drive through Kamloops without a stop at *Peter's Pasta* for a meal and cup of coffee. After a cup of Peter's coffee it would be immoral,

illegal and imprudent to drive farther. Peter's Pasta is two blocks from the Kamloops Youth Hostel.

The Banff Youth Hostel is—in one person's opinion—the best place to stay while visiting there. The guests are always interesting, friendly and have a consistent *joie de vivre*. It is luxurious by hostel and budget travel standards, and of course the price is accommodating.

ne could well imagine a contingent of PWC members taking the train to the 2000 Festival, enjoying Banff, and the Hostel, and community meals in the kitchen and the inevitable round-table discussions. The format for 2000 has been expanded to seven days, and the presen-





ters are truly stellar. A short list includes Lynn Hill, Sir Christian Bonington, Kitty Calhoun, Greg Child, Yvon Chouinard, Catherine Destivelle, Sir Edmund Hillary, Thomas Hornbein, Reinhold Messner, Royal Robins, Ed Viesturs, among twenty-eight or so lined up at this date. It is hardly essential that one attend all seven days to enjoy the Festival but it goes without saying that tickets will become rare by October.
