Come join professional photographer Alan L. Bauer as he shares his adventures and beauty of the Washington Cascades covered in his recent books *“Day Hiking-South Cascades,” “Day Hiking-Snoqualmie Region,”* and maybe sneaking in a few stories from his experience with *“Day Hiking-Mount Rainier,”* all published by The Mountaineers Books. Regions ranging from the northern Alpine Lakes Wilderness, all the way south to the Columbia River Gorge will be shared, emphasizing the areas closest to where you can hike from the South Puget Sound and Kitsap Peninsula regions. From waterfalls and wide vistas, wildlife encounters and humorous tales, there will be many new ideas shared to get you outside to play more. Books will be available for purchase and signing after the presentation and Q&A time.



Alan L. Bauer is a professional freelance photographer specializing in the natural history of the Pacific Northwest and coverage of local history. He is a lifelong resident of the Pacific Northwest, having grown up on a large family farm in Oregon's Willamette Valley, and now calling Washington State his home for the past 23 years. Much of his love for the outdoors can be traced back to his life being outside on the farm working and playing—an experience he wouldn't trade for anything!

His published work includes *Backpacker*, *Odyssey*, *Northwest Runner*, *CityDog*, *Oregon Coast*, and *Northwest Travel* magazines, as well as numerous publications and books across 14 countries. He regularly provides images for projects including CD covers, textbooks, websites, presentations, research, and corporate materials. University Audi, Children's Hospital, Columbia Basin Credit Union, and the Oregon Historical Society are a few examples of his recent corporate work. Recently he was featured as a Master Craftsman for macro photography work in *Smart Photography*, the top photography magazine in India.

He has been the published co-author/photographer in numerous titles by The Mountaineers Books, the most recent being the new “Day Hiking” series. His work on “Day Hiking-Snoqualmie Region,” “Day Hiking-South Cascades,” and “Day Hiking-Mount Rainier,” came to a close with the recent release of “Day Hiking-Central Cascades” in May 2009. Prior to his involvement with this new book series he was co-author of “Best Desert Hikes” and “Best Dog Hikes: Inland NW” with The Mountaineers Books as well as primary photography/co-author of “Best Loop Hikes: Washington.”

Please Call Early

As a courtesy to the sponsor of an outing in which you are interested, please try to call at least two days before the trip for single-day outings, and as soon as possible for overnight outings. This allows the sponsor time to make necessary arrangements, or alternate plans, should a trip be canceled for some reason. Your consideration will be greatly appreciated.

Blake Island Kayak Overnight

This is an easy (4 miles each way, no current) class I-II overnight for those who would like to practice kayak camping, and for everyone else, too. You'll have a chance to check out sea kayak camping gear, and do some night paddling if you choose to.

On a clear day, a trip around Blake is like seeing the Puget Sound slowly turning through 360 degrees in front of you: Blake, Vashon, Federal Way, the Cascades, Alki, Seattle, Mt. Baker, Bainbridge, the Olympics, and then Manchester. Tides are about .3 feet each morning, rising to 10.8 ft. at 2 pm on Saturday and 11.2 ft at 3 pm on Sunday.

Bring your hiking shoes to explore Blake on the dirt road that circles the island. On your hike around Blake you will pass the primitive campsite on the southern shore, and the marine trails campsite near the spit on the NW corner of the island.

We will launch at a leisurely 11 am from the Manchester boat ramp (north of the Southworth Ferry terminal in Manchester). Free parking is available a half block away on Colchester Drive, opposite the Family Inn Restaurant. We will circle the island counter-clockwise and beach the boats at Tillicum Village, on the NE corner of the island. Share a campsite at the southern-most corner of the large lawn. Campground sites cost \$19, but several tents fit on each site. A shower is available.

Indian Heaven – Forlorn Lakes Campout

We plan to camp at Forlorn Lakes camping area with more than eight lakes, directly adjacent to the Indian Heaven Wilderness. The lakes will offer kayaking and the wilderness miles of excellent hiking. We may also visit some of the local lava caves. There are several camp sites at Forlorn Lakes. We plan to arrive on October 7th and acquire a campsite suitable for this trip. Feel free to come for all or part of the campout; we plan to leave sometime on October 12th.

Indian Heaven Wilderness is 20,600 acres of broad, rolling country, straddling the crest of the Cascade Range with subalpine meadows and 175 small lakes. The area offers visitors wildlife and panoramic views, as well as wildflowers and huckleberries, in season. There are nearly 42 miles of trails providing a variety of backcountry experiences. Fall is a good time to visit, with brilliant colors flourishing, and the mosquito season nearly over.

Indian Heaven Wilderness was created in 1984 as part of the Washington Wilderness Bill. Located between Mt. Adams and the Columbia River Gorge, Indian Heaven is situated on a high plateau with numerous open meadows, forested areas, and more than 150 lakes. Many of the lakes are stocked to provide good fishing for anglers. The natural scenic beauty of Indian Heaven is enhanced by several interesting volcanic formations such as East Crater and Lake Sahalee-Tyee. Lemei Rock is the highest point in the area, at 5,927 feet, and provides majestic views of the Cascades and Wapiki Lake.

Winterfest is the PWC's traditional winter President's Day Weekend getaway. We usually get lodging for anywhere from 20 to 50 adult skiers, boarders, snowshoers, good book readers, and gourmet chefs. In years past we've gone to Stevens Pass, White Pass, Mt. Rainier, and Mission Ridge. One of our best trips was at Snoqualmie Pass, where the club had the entire Mountaineers' cabin to ourselves (the year before it burned down, sigh). This year's trip to Mt. Baker is similar in that we are renting a big house specifically designed for large groups. You can check out the accommodations at:

Mt. Baker Ski area offers primarily alpine skiing, but there are snowshoe trails nearby, and spectacular backcountry is accessible from the parking lot. Several members plan to snowshoe or backcountry ski. Tell me what your interests are when you sign up, and I'll keep the PWC calendar entry for this event updated to include participants and interests.

Our rental house is in Glacier, a 30-minute drive below the ski area. It has 12 rooms with queen beds and a loft with a hide-a-bed. We can rent incrementally to 12, 20, or 26 people. The cost varies from \$65 to \$46 per night per person, depending on how many sign up. Although singles will need to share queen beds, the accommodations and bathroom facilities are far superior to those at the Mountaineers' Cabins. If a concern, bring a lightweight sleeping bag to use on the bed.

The kitchen and dining area is spacious, and should accommodate cooking for everyone. We'll coordinate cooking groups before the trip. I'm told there is plenty of parking space.

March 2011 Grand Canyon Hike

Preliminary planning is underway for the Spring, 2011 Grand Canyon trip. There are four potential routes; details follow. (All mileages are approximate. All day hikes are optional and dependent on canyon terrain and conditions).

1. Haunted / Phantom Canyon and Comanche Point / Cape Solitude. (11 days, 10 nights, 50 miles backpacking, 70 miles

day-hiking) This is a 2-part trip. First, we descend to Bright Angel Campground via the South Kaibab Trail. Next we take the "Banzai Route" up to a dry camp at Utah Flats and explore Cheops Pyramid and Utah Flats. Then we continue on to the confluence of Haunted and Phantom Creeks and set up a base camp. From the base camp we explore Haunted and Phantom Canyons and then return to Bright Angel Campground via lower Phantom Canyon. We exit to the South Rim via the Bright Angel Trail. After spending the night on the South Rim, we head out on a 3-day, 2-night trip from Desert View to Cape Solitude, which is directly above the confluence of the Colorado and Little Colorado Rivers. On the way to Cape Solitude, we take a side trip out to Comanche Point.

2. Clear Creek Exploration. (10 days, 9 nights, 42 miles backpacking, 70 miles day hiking) We descend to Bright Angel Campground via the South Kaibab Trail. From here we take the Clear Creek Trail to Clear Creek and set up a base camp. From the base camp, we do several day hikes including to the Colorado River, Cheyava Falls, Ariel Falls, Obi Canyon and to Brahma Temple. We also do an overnight trip exploring the East Fork of Clear Creek. After this, we return to Bright Angel Campground via the Clear Creek Trail and exit to the South Rim via the Bright Angel Trail.

3. Royal Arch / The "Gems". (11 days, 10 nights, 75 miles backpacking, 45 miles day hiking) We enter the canyon from the South Bass Trailhead and hike west along the Esplanade to Royal Arch Canyon. We then descend Royal Arch Canyon to Royal Arch and then proceed to the Colorado River (encountering a 20-ft rappel along the way). After a day hike to Elves Chasm and Stephen Aisle, we head to Copper Canyon, which we spend a day exploring, and then continue east on the Tonto Trail passing several side canyons known collectively as "The Gems" until we reach Boucher Canyon. We spend time day hiking several side canyons and rapids along the way. Several potentially dry camps may be encountered. We exit the canyon to Hermit's Rest via the Boucher Trail.

4. Tanner Canyon / Hance Canyon. (10 days, 9 nights, 37 miles backpacking, 90 miles day hiking) We enter the canyon at Lipan Point using the Tanner Trail. After exploring Tanner Canyon we head east to Lava Canyon Rapids, exploring side canyons along the way. Next, a day hike to the Little Colorado River confluence. Then we head west and continue past Tanner Rapids to Unkar Delta and the Hilltop Ruins, with side canyon exploration along the way. Following this, we take the Escalante Route to Hance Rapids, taking several days and exploring more side canyons. We exit to the South Rim via the New Hance (Red Canyon) Trail.

All these routes are for experienced canyon hikers only and include off trail backpacking and day hiking, route finding skills and dry camping. Maximum group size is 6 and the permit request will be sent in on November 1. ARTWORK COVERING A LIFE IN THE MOUNTAINS: The Art of Dee Molenaar

During October the Old Town Custom Framing and Art Gallery will host a display of artwork and landform maps of one of its local senior citizens, Dee Molenaar.

Internationally known for his alpine art and landform maps, at age 92, Dee is a member of the Peninsula Wilderness Club and an Honorary Member of The Mountaineers and The American Alpine Club. Molenaar will display a number of his paintings and maps that represent a cross-section of his life among mountains, "From the Hollywood Hills to the Himalayas and the South Pole."

In 1940 the Dee and his brother began their close association with Mount Rainier, serving as guides and rangers in the Park. Dee has scaled the mountain over 50 times, via some fifteen routes, including three first ascents: the Nisqually Icefall in 1948, the Wilson Glacier Headwall in 1957, and the Central Mowich Face in 1966. Dee has also participated in several major expeditions. These include, in 1946, achieving first American ascent and first south-side ascent of Alaska's 18,008-foot Mt. St. Elias, the highest coastal mountain in the world. In 1953 Dee was a member of the tragedy-marred American expedition to K2 in the Karakoram Himalaya, in 1960 in a rescue mission on Mt. McKinley, and in 1965 in the first ascent of Mt. Kennedy in the Yukon, with the late Sen. Robert Kennedy and American Everest Jim Whittaker.

Dee's explorations and climbs at Mount Rainier resulted in his book, *The Challenge of Rainier*, published in 1971 by The Mountaineers. During the Governor's Writers' Day in Olympia, the book earned a special award for non-fiction. The book is now in its 10th printing and is being prepared for an extensive overhaul in 2011, to celebrate its 40-year longevity.

Molenaar's artwork will include framed originals and laser prints, along with self-published landform maps that cover his areas of travel among the ranges of western U.S. and Canada, Alaska, the Alps, Andes, New Zealand, Antarctica, and Himalayas.

Besides artwork and maps, Dee will have on hand for sale and signing his *The Challenge of Rainier*, along with his recent (2009) publication, *Mountains Don't Care, But We Do: An Early History of Mountain Rescues in the Pacific Northwest and Founding of the Mountain Rescue Association*.

The public is invited to the reception from 6 through 8 pm on Friday, October 15. Light refreshments will be served. His work will be displayed in the Gallery until November 1st, 2010.
